

## Proposed changes to study options at the University of Sydney

### Nursing courses

Undergraduate nursing may no longer be offered at the University of Sydney.

Federal Education Minister Brendan Nelson has approved a proposal to transfer nursing places from the University of Sydney to the University of Technology, Sydney (UTS) and the Australian Catholic University (ACU).

The proposal, if implemented, will see additional nursing places offered at ACU and at UTS.

The Bachelor of Nursing (Indigenous Australian Health) will continue to be offered by the University of Sydney in 2005.

Dr Nelson said changes will increase the number of nursing training opportunities in metropolitan Sydney.

### Orange Campus

A further change agreed to by the Minister is the transfer of 240 funded places from the University of Sydney to Charles Sturt University (CSU) for the Orange Campus. CSU has also been allocated 100 new funded places for the Orange Campus. Undergraduate courses in the Faculty of Rural Management offered at the Orange Campus would be transferred to CSU as part of the proposed transfer of the Orange Campus to CSU.

CSU Vice-Chancellor Professor Ian Goulter said that CSU representatives were now having formal discussions with the University of Sydney about the Orange Campus now that he has received written advice from Dr Nelson about the allocation of funded places to the Orange Campus.

The University of Sydney said it would continue its commitment to rural and regional NSW through its extensive and long-standing network of teaching and research within the faculties of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources, Veterinary Science, Medicine and Health Sciences.

## Changes for 2004 IB students

The *UAC 2005 Guide* incorrectly states that 2004 International Baccalaureate (IB) students can use Apply-By-Telephone to apply for 2005 admissions.

IB students will **not** be able to use UAC's Apply-By-Telephone to apply. IB students must use UAC's Apply-By-Web to apply. IB students that do not have web access can contact UAC for a written application form.

The reason for this late change is that the student numbers for IB candidates now include alpha characters. UAC's Apply-By-Telephone interacts with an applicant's telephone keypad and so accepts only numeric characters.

## UAC 2005 Guides for interstate students

As soon as the *UAC 2005 Guide* is printed, UAC will provide interstate schools with free reference copies. Unfortunately, UAC cannot provide a free copy for every interstate Year 12 student. Interstate careers advisers will receive a letter from UAC explaining how to order additional copies of the *UAC 2005 Guide* for students interested in applying through UAC for 2005 admissions.

**Course accreditation**

242604 B Health Science  
(Nutrition and Dietetics)

CSU's B Health Science (Nutrition and Dietetics) - which commenced in 2000, has been granted provisional accreditation by the Board of Dietitians Association of Australia (DAA). The course was developed within DAA guidelines and became eligible for provisional accreditation following the graduation of the initial intake of students in April this year. Full accreditation is normally granted after two intakes have graduated.

As result of this accreditation, all graduates from the B Health Science (Nutrition and Dietetics) are now eligible to apply for DAA membership and for Accredited Practising Dietician (APD) status.

**University of Newcastle****New Bachelor of Arts**

The Bachelor of Arts course for offer in 2005 at both the Callaghan and Ourimbah campuses has been revised. Students will now complete two majors, chosen from a range of humanities-based disciplines, and have free choice for the remaining subjects.

New majors available to students include Community Welfare and Human Services, Creative Arts, Cross-Cultural Communication, Film and Television Studies, Human Geography and the Environment, International Affairs, Politics and Policy, and Writing.

Students interested in applying for the B Arts at the Callaghan campus should include in their preferences UAC code 480030 for a HECS place, and/or 490030 for a local fee-paying place.

Students interested in applying for the B Arts at the Ourimbah campus should include in their preferences UAC code 480040 for a HECS place and/or 490040 for a local fee-paying place.

**New Bachelor of Social Science**

The Bachelor of Social Science course for offer in 2005 at the Callaghan and Ourimbah campuses has been revised. New majors available include Community Welfare and Human Services, Economic Policy Analysis, Gender Studies, Historical Studies, Human Geography, Industrial Relations and Human Resource Management, Media and Cultural Studies, Philosophical and Religious Studies, Politics and Policy, and Psychology.

The program also includes a series of prescribed subjects that will provide students with the professional skills expected by employers today, such as social research, program and organisational management, and policy development and evaluation.

Students interested in applying for the B Social Science at the Callaghan campus should include in their preferences UAC code 480870 for a HECS place and/or 490870 for a local fee-paying place.

Students interested in applying for the B Social Science at the Ourimbah campus should include in the preferences UAC code 480880 for a HECS place and/or 490880 for a local fee-paying place.

**Applying for B Engineering at the University of Newcastle**

Students wishing to apply for Engineering programs for 2005, other than B Engineering - Mining Transfer Program, need only include one UAC code (480255) for a HECS place and/or one UAC code (490255) for a local fee-paying place in their preferences. Students receiving an offer into B Engineering will be asked to indicate their specialisation upon acceptance.

Specialisations available are chemical, civil, computer, electrical, environmental, mechanical, mechatronics, software and telecommunications.

This allows students to use fewer of their available preferences and still have the option of nine engineering specialisations.

Students wishing to combine B Engineering with another program need to also include UAC code 480265, however specified combinations apply. See the *UAC 2005 Guide* for details or contact the Faculty of Engineering and Built Environment on (02) 4921 6065 for more information.

**New program - B Oral Health**

A new program is on offer for 2005 targeted at people wishing to work in the field of oral health care. Graduates will gain the skills and knowledge to enable them to pursue careers in clinical, education, research and leadership in oral health care and, subject to accreditation, register and practice as dental hygienists.

The program will be based at the Ourimbah campus, however students may be required to attend some sessions at the Callaghan campus. Many year three components will also be available via distance.

Students interested in applying for B Oral Health should include in their preferences UAC code 480764 for a HECS place and/or 490764 for a local fee-paying place, as well as complete a Faculty of Health application form by 30 October 2004. Applicants will also be required to attend a Personal Qualities Assessment (PQA) during November 2004.

**Two University of Newcastle programs now available at Port Macquarie**

An exciting new partnership with the North Coast Institute of TAFE means that two University of Newcastle programs can now be offered at the TAFE Port Macquarie campus.

Programs available from 2005 are B Applied Information Technology and B Nursing. The University hopes to expand this offering in future years.

Students interested in studying B Applied Information Technology at the Port Macquarie campus should include in their preferences UAC code 480022 for a HECS place and/or 490022 for a local fee-paying place.

Students interested in studying B Nursing at the Port Macquarie campus should include UAC code 480756 for a HECS place and/or 490756 for a local fee-paying place.

## University of Sydney

### Direct entry into medicine

The University of Sydney will admit a small number of school leavers into its medicine program next year. In this program, which is called Combined Medicine, students can choose to study either advanced science or medical science for the first three years and, as long as they meet minimum requirements, proceed directly into the graduate medicine program which requires four years of full time study.

In addition to submitting a UAC application by 30 September 2004, applicants will be required to submit a special application form and curriculum vitae directly to the University by 30 September 2004. Short-listed applicants will be interviewed in January 2005. Applicants do not need to sit for GAMSAT or UMAT. ### International studies

Subject to final approval, the University will commence a Bachelor of International Studies program in 2005. This course will focus on the economic and political dimensions of the global system and will consist of a core sequence of study in international studies. Students will have the option of pursuing majors offered by the Faculty of Economics and Business as well as other faculties such as Arts and Education and Social Work.

### Oral health

Students interested in working in the areas of dental hygiene, dental therapy or oral health promotion should consider applying for a new three-year full-time program in Oral Health. To be eligible for entry in 2005 students must have applied to sit UMAT by 11 June 2004.

Additional entry criteria include a manual skills test and structured interview.

### Liberal Arts and Science\*

A new three-year liberal arts degree will enable students to acquire key understandings in the arts, sciences, law and economics and business, while also allowing students to pursue an interest in certain specialised areas. Available subject areas include foundation courses in arts, sciences, law and economics, normally taken in the first year, and other subjects of the student's choice drawn from a wide range of discipline areas available across the university, including those listed in the *UAC 2005 Guide* under B Arts 511200 and B Science 512040. Honours is available to qualified students in an additional fourth year. The degree is targeted at students who seek a broadly based education, with a view to a career in the government or private sphere in organisations whose activities cross a broad range of civic and commercial areas. Career opportunities, depending on specialisations chosen, include policy development, administration and research in government and private organisations, public and private management and administration and a wide range of careers in areas involving breadth of understanding and problem solving skills.

*\*Subject to final approval. This course does not appear in the UAC 2005 Guide.*

### Bachelor of Animal Science

The Faculties of Veterinary Science, Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources and Science are planning a comprehensive review of the Bachelor of Animal Science curriculum in 2005 to identify areas for development to enhance animal-related and bioscience units of study.

### Discontinued courses

The Bachelor of Science (Media and Communication) will no longer be offered to new students from 2005. Students can take many of the options available in this program in the Bachelor of Arts (Media and Communication) program.

### Postgraduate admissions through UAC

UAC will be processing applications for admission to postgraduate coursework programs for participating institutions in 2005. The participating institutions are Australian Catholic University, Australian National University, Macquarie University, University of New England, University of Newcastle, University of Technology, Sydney and University of Western Sydney. The UAC 2005 Postgraduate Coursework Booklet, containing course details and an application form, will be available free of charge from UAC and participating institutions from September 2004. # More university places allocated

## for enrolment by 2008

The Federal Government has announced that more than 9000 additional university places have been allocated to NSW and ACT institutions for enrolment by 2008.

The allocation is part of the 25 000 extra places provided through the Government's higher education reform package, *Our Universities: Backing Australia's Future*.

All universities in NSW will receive an allocation, with almost half of the places going to the State's regional areas. Following is a guide to the number of places allocated to each institution.

**Australian Catholic University (ACU National)** will receive 550 additional places at its NSW and ACT campuses by 2008, in the areas of nursing, teaching, language and literature and social work.

**Australian National University** will receive 205 additional places by 2008, and expects to be able to offer 75 extra undergraduate places for 2005 admissions.

**Charles Sturt University (CSU)** will receive 979 additional fully-funded places by 2008. A majority of these new places will go to the University's main campuses in Albury-Wodonga, Bathurst, Dubbo and Wagga Wagga. CSU expects that this will meet some of the demand for courses in health science, nursing, social welfare, business and teaching, as well as

providing an opportunity for further articulation with TAFE.

**Macquarie University** will receive 957 additional places by 2008, with 350 new places for 2005 admissions. These places will be spread across teacher education, human resource management, science and technology, conveyancing and law, and actuarial studies.

**Southern Cross University (SCU)** will receive 807 additional places by 2008, with 295 new places for 2005 admissions. These places will be spread across all three SCU campuses and will cover a range of disciplines including aged care, nursing, midwifery, education, tourism management, social science, marine science and human resource management.

**University of Canberra** will receive 246 additional places by 2008.

**University of New England** will receive 506 additional places by 2008, with 185 new places for 2005 admissions, including 10 nursing places. The other 175 places comprise 100 for teacher education (20 for early childhood), 25 for general nursing, 10 for community health, 10 for marine science, 20 for agribusiness, five for communication and media studies, and five for policy studies.

**University of New South Wales** will receive 219 additional places by 2008.

**University of Newcastle** will receive 1266 additional places by 2008, with 463 new places for 2005 admissions. These include 365 new places at the Ourimbah Campus, with 60 in nursing, 50 in oral health and 130 in education, as well as additional places in arts, management, mathematics, nutrition, science and psychology. The Port Macquarie Campus received 45 places in nursing and 25 in business and management. The Callaghan Campus has 20 new places in radiation therapy, and eight places in speech pathology.

**University of Sydney** will receive 1422 additional places by 2008, meaning new degrees in liberal arts and oral health, and providing extra places for students in pharmacy, health sciences, and the natural and physical sciences. There will also be more places in education, languages, economics and business.

**University of Technology, Sydney** will receive 191 additional places by 2008.

**University of Western Sydney** will receive 1561 additional places by 2008, with 571 new places for 2005 admissions. These places will be in a range of disciplines, including education, nursing, financial services, business, engineering, science, and medical science.

**University of Wollongong** will receive 943 additional places by 2008. These places will be spread across all campuses and will cover a range of disciplines.

# UAI eligibility rule change

## for 2006 NSW HSC

For 2006 NSW HSC student and thereafter, Rule 1 - the eligibility rule for a UAI - has changed. Under the new rule students must satisfactorily complete at least eight units of Category A courses to be eligible for a UAI. The UAI eligibility rule has not previously specified a minimum number of Category A units to be eligible for a UAI.

This change has been introduced to ensure that all students who receive a UAI will have their UAI based on 10 units.

As Year 10 students are now choosing their Year 12 program of study, please make sure checks are in place to ensure that students are enrolled in the correct courses if they wish to receive a UAI. Also, as students move into

Year 11 and Year 12 and change their course enrolments it is important to check that they still maintain a minimum of eight units of Category A courses in their program of study.

The changes to the UAI rules were included in the 2007 Year 10 Booklet.

**From the 2006 HSC, Rule 1 - Eligibility for a UAI, is as follows:** To be eligible for a UAI you must satisfactorily complete at least 10 units (including at least two units of English) of UAI courses including at least eight units of Category A courses. Courses completed must include at least three Board Developed courses of two units or greater and at least four subjects.

### UAI courses

UAI courses are Board Developed courses for which there are examinations conducted by the Board of Studies that yield a graded assessment. These are the only courses that can be included in the UAI calculations. UAI courses are classified as either Category A courses or Category B courses.

# Year 12 Checklist

## for applying to university

### Do you know your PIN?

Your UAC Personal Identification Number (PIN) is your key to applying through UAC and accessing information about your application.

The four-digit number allows you to access information such as your course preferences, offers and your UAI from UAC's web site and InfoLine.

Considering how important this number is - and that it can take time to re-issue it if you lose or forget it - remember to keep your UAC PIN in a secure place.

#### What is your UAC PIN?

If you are attempting the 2004 NSW HSC and 2004 ACT Year 12, you are issued with your four-digit UAC PIN in the mail in August.

#### What if my PIN doesn't work

If your UAC PIN doesn't work, check that you are trying to use the correct number. If you are using the correct number and are still experiencing difficulties, call UAC on (02) 9752 0200.

#### Changing your UAC PIN

You can change your UAC PIN via UAC's web site. If you don't have web access call UAC on (02) 9752 0200 to change your UAC PIN.

You will be asked to provide your:

- name and address
- date of birth
- student number and school.

If your details do not match those held by UAC you must submit a written request to UAC with the above information and the following:

- a copy of photo identification
- your Australian daytime telephone number
- your signature.

Submit your written request either:

Your UAC PIN will be re-issued to you by telephone call from UAC. BE WARNED. Several working days are needed to re-issue your UAC PIN so send your written request well before you need to use your UAC PIN.

Your UAC PIN will be re-issued to you over the counter.

#### Lost or forgotten UAC PINs

If you are a 2004 NSW HSC or 2004 ACT Year 12 student and have lost or forgotten your UAC PIN, you can have your UAC PIN re-issued by calling UAC on (02) 9752 0200. you will be asked to provide personal information as described above under "Changing your UAC PIN".

### Have you moved house?

It is important that you provide UAC with an up-to-date address and telephone number so we can easily contact you - and ensure you receive your UAC Personal Identification Number which allows you to apply and access information such as your preferences, offers and UAI.

You can change your address after submitting your UAC applications via:

- the change of address form at the back of the *UAC 2005 Guide*.

Telephone, email and fax requests will not be accepted by UAC for security reasons.

You must also separately notify the Board of Studies of your new address. To change your address with the Board of Studies write a letter to:

You must include your:

- full name
- student number

### Do you need to provide Supplementary information?

Some 2004 Year 12 students may need to submit supplementary information as a part of their application. Refer to page 12 of the UAC 2005 Guide for details. There are two ways in which to provide this information. If you are using Apply-By-Web, you may submit information via this application. There are two versions of Apply-By-Web for Year 12 students. Read the instructions which accompany the application to decide which version you are required to use. If you are using Apply-By-Telephone, you must submit your supplementary information via the paper Supplementary Form A contained in the Year 12 student edition of the *UAC 2005 Guide*.

Remember that IB students can only Apply-By-Web. Due to alpha numeric student number they cannot use Apply-By-Telephone.

### Do you need someone to act on your behalf?

If you will be away for all or part of the admissions period (August 2004 - February 2005) and need to authorise someone to act on your behalf during your absence you will need to advise UAC.

You can do this by either:

- submitting a Supplementary Form A (question 14); or
- providing a letter which authorises someone to act on your behalf. The letter must contain your UAC application number; your full name and signature, and the full name and signature of the person authorised to act on your behalf.

If you are going overseas remember to take a copy of the *UAC Guide*, your UAC number and your UAC PIN with you.

**✓ Are you eligible to apply for Educational Access Schemes?**

Most of the universities in NSW and the ACT have Educational Access Schemes (EAS) which are designed to help provide access to university for students who have experienced long-term educational disadvantage such as:

- disrupted schooling
- home environment and responsibilities
- personal illness/disability.

UAC's EAS booklet contains information about the universities' schemes and includes an EAS application form. EAS applications must be submitted to UAC by Thursday 30 September 2004.

See your careers adviser early for information about the schemes and to get an EAS booklet. If you think you are eligible, start organising your EAS application as early as possible as you will need to supply supporting documents and statements.

Keep a copy of your EAS application form and documents. Why? You may have to provide a copy of your EAS application form and all documentation to the university if you require on-going support during your studies.

**✓ Are you studying overseas?**

If you are an Australian citizen, permanent resident or New Zealand citizen studying a 2004 Australian Year 12 overseas, you will not be able to use the Apply-By-Telephone facility to submit your application.

You must use either Apply-By-Web or complete a specially designed application form that has been sent to overseas schools offering Australian Year 12 studies.

**✓ Are you studying an International Baccalaureate (IB)?**
