## ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Admission requirements are the minimum qualifications you need before you can be selected for entry to a course. In addition to reaching the standard of performance required for one of the following entry methods, you must also satisfy any additional selection criteria listed for the course. The following qualifications may meet the admission requirements for the University.

### Australian secondary studies

#### 2017 Australian Year 12

If you are a 2017 Australian Year 12 student you will generally be selected on the basis of your ATAR or equivalent.

#### Offers made to applicants who have an ATAR below the published cut-off

UOW has a number of alternative pathways for admission, which may allow 2017 NSW and ACT Year 12 applicants to receive an offer to a course even though they have an ATAR below the published cut-off. They include:

- UOW Early Admission scheme (open to all states and IB students)
- Points to UOW program
- Bonus Points Scheme
- Alternative Admissions Program for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander applicants
- Educational Access Scheme.

## UOW Early Admission

UOW is always looking for passionate students who enjoy learning. If you are a high-achieving student with the appropriate skills and academic strengths required for one of our degrees, this will be recognised with UOW Early Admission. We'll get to know you, look at your results and reward your hard work with a place at UOW before you even sit your first exam. Applications open Tuesday 1 August 2017 and close Friday 25 August 2017. ### Points to UOW

At UOW we recognise that strong performance in subjects relevant to the degree you wish to study can be an indicator of likely success.

UOW will award a maximum of three additional points for outstanding performance. This is in addition to any other bonuses for which you may also be eligible, including the UOW Bonus Points Scheme or UAC's Educational Access Scheme. ### Bonus Points Scheme

If you have a UOW course as a preference and you completed your HSC in 2017 at one of the schools in our local area, or at a rural or remote school in NSW, you will automatically receive three bonus points, which will apply to all your UOW courses. ### Previous Australian Year 12

If you have previously completed an Australian Year 12 you may be considered on the basis of your latest ATAR or equivalent. If you have attempted tertiary study since completing Year 12, you may be assessed on the basis of these subsequent studies.

### Australian tertiary studies

If you have completed at least half a year of full-time study (ie 0.5 EFTSL) at a university you may be assessed on the basis of your academic performance (our Law degrees require a minimum of one year of full-time study; ie 1.00 EFTSL). If you have completed an AQF Certificate IV\*, AQF Diploma or AQF Advanced Diploma you may be considered for admission on the basis of those studies.

\* Successful completion of a Certificate IV does not provide entry to all undergraduate degrees.

### Overseas qualifications

Australian citizens or permanent residents of Australia with overseas qualifications must contact UOW's Future Students office to discuss eligibility for admission before applying through UAC. If you hold overseas qualifications from countries where English is not the standard language of instruction, you must provide evidence of English language proficiency – visit [uac.edu.au/undergraduate/admission/elp.shtml](http://uac.edu.au/undergraduate/admission/elp.shtml).

### Alternative entry and pathways

If you do not have any of the formal educational qualifications specified in the above categories, you may qualify under the following categories for entry to the University.

### University preparation schemes

UOW College offers a variety of academic preparation courses designed for students who want to study at the University but who do not qualify for direct entry. It is the private college of UOW, located on the UOW Wollongong, Shoalhaven, Batemans Bay and South Western Sydney campuses, so College students have full access to the facilities of UOW while they study. ### Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT)

If you are at least 21 years of age by Thursday 1 March 2018, and do not otherwise qualify for entry to the University, you may apply for admission on the basis of STAT Multiple Choice. STAT cannot be used to gain admission to Engineering, Law, Mathematics or Physics degrees. For further details on STAT, visit [stat.acer.org](http://stat.acer.org).

### Tertiary Preparation Certificate/TAFE qualifications

If you have completed a TAFE Tertiary Preparation Certificate you will be considered for admission on the basis of your Tertiary Entrance Score.

### Limited ATAR

UOW accepts the NSW Limited ATAR for admission purposes – read section 2.4 in Part 1.

## EDUCATIONAL ACCESS SCHEMES

UOW has an Educational Access Scheme (EAS) to assist applicants who have been educationally or financially disadvantaged.

## EQUITY SCHOLARSHIPS

UOW's Commonwealth Indigenous Scholarships are open to all eligible applicants applying to, or enrolled at, UOW. All UOW Commonwealth Indigenous Scholarships applications are processed centrally through UAC.

UOW also offers three types of Equity Scholarships: UOW Equity, UOW General Residential and UOW Mature Age Scholarships for new commencing students.

### Exchange programs

One alternative to taking a gap year is to consider the International Exchange Program. If you're interested in travelling, UOW offers a range of options including short overseas courses to fully international degrees, meaning you can choose to learn in another country for a few months to a few years.

By taking advantage of UOW's 170 study abroad and exchange links in 46 countries, you can explore the globe while you study. Students can access a UOW Travel Grant or more than \$17,000 in an OS-HELP loan to assist with one year of overseas study (this can be added to your HECS-HELP). Subjects taken offshore can be credited towards your UOW degree, so you can still graduate at the same time as your peers.
